The tiny change in the wedding ceremony was made so subtly in recent years that few people even noticed, but now a large number of couples say "as long as our love shall last" in place of "till death do us part." In the movie *Fireproof*, Caleb and Catherine have basically bought into the lie that their marriage is a contract based on *feelings* that can easily be broken when things get tough, instead of a lifelong covenant based on *commitment* that can survive and even thrive in the fires of life.

Ruth Graham, wife of world-reknown evangelist Billy Graham, was once asked if she ever considered divorcing her husband. She responded with a twinkle in her eye, "Murder yes, divorce no." When a couple is going through a time of conflict, emotions start to escalate. If there is no foundation of *unconditional love*, anger and frustration

can quickly get out of control. Concerns become complaints, complaints become threats, and threats lead to ultimatums. One spouse begins to put down the other. Suddenly there's nothing in the home but name calling and cutting remarks. And once a couple starts down this path, each person begins to withdraw and shut down emotionally. It's a toxic recipe that can only lead to disaster and divorce.

In the Bible's love poem *Song of Solomon* (2:15, NIV) we read, "Catch for us the foxes, the little foxes that ruin the vineyards, our vineyards that are in bloom." The little foxes represent those things that quietly destroy relationships. Foxes get into vineyards to feed on the grapes, and the keepers must prop up the branches so the foxes can't reach them. Most marriages fall apart because trivial things are allowed to grow into big issues. Failure to "prop up the vines" and take care of business now can result in disastrous failure later on. And one little fox that destroys more families than any other is *financial pressure* – it is the leading cause of divorce in our society. You see, it's a short distance from "making money to live" to "living to make money." One of the major arguments in *Fireproof* deals with the way Caleb and Catherine handle their finances. He selfishly saves for a boat and is unwilling to part with his dream, even when they need the money to help her ailing parents. That's why the ultimate sign of Caleb's changed heart at the end of the movie is when he sacrifices his \$24,000 savings to pay his in-laws' medical bills.
